

DANGERS

Can you number the following danaers on the picture?

- Look out for deep or shallow water and take care around
- Stay back from cliff edges and never jump from high cliffs or bridges
- It's often windy at the coast and you can burn easily so wear sun cream and a hat
- Red flag means danger so stay out of the water
- Look out for rescue equipment and signs – they're there to keep vou safe
- Currents can push you out to sea
- Never mix alcohol and swimming
- Never use inflatables in the sea
- Red and yellow flags show a safe zone where Lifequards are keeping an eye on you
- Trained Lifeguards are there to keep you safe. Listen to them carefully
- Always watch children near water and keep within arm's reach




SWIM at lifequarded lakes


